1991-07-09 - South Africa readmitted to **Olympics.** The UNESCO General Conference advises the UN General Assembly that UNESCO member states want to have May 3 declared as World Press Freedom Media Day, as per the Windhoek Declaration.

The Windhoek Declaration inspires the setting up of the Media Institute of Southern Africa (Misa) and the International Freedom of eXpression Exchange (IFEX) – today an alliance of 72 free speech groups across the world.

South Africa votes for change

March 18, 1992

White South Africans have backed an overwhelming mandate for political reforms to end apartheid and create a power-sharing multi-racial government.

Leading journalists from around Africa attend a UNESCO conference in newly-independent Namibia on 3 May. They adopt the "Windhoek Declaration on Promoting an Independent African Press" – a statement which strongly promotes press freedom and pluralism. The Declaration highlights the need for "a press independent from governmental, political or economic control or from control of materials and infrastructure essential for the production and dissemination of newspapers, magazines and periodicals.

Ahead of democratic elections, South Africans agree that broadcasting must be politically independent, and the Independent Broadcasting Authority is legislated into being.

Weekly Mail distributes first South African newspaper by email.

1993

In December, the UN General Assembly took note of the Windhoek Declaration and dedicated May 3 as an annual anniversary to be known as "World Press Freedom Day".

African journalists laid down a key foundation for press freedom when they produced the Windhoek Declaration in 1991. This powerful statement helped to influence the negotiators who drew up the South African constitution, who in turn ensured that Section 16 specifies the rights to both freedom of expression and media freedom. The Windhoek Declaration also led to the United Nations adopting 3 May as the annual "World Press Freedom Day". Over the years, South African journalists have taken part in marking this anniversary, as well as that of 19 October – the National Media Freedom Day. The result is that South Africa enjoys a dual dose of attention to press freedom.

An independent inquiry later found that deposition to be false but Clinton was acquitted on perjury and obstruction of justice charges, and remained President until the end of his second term in 2001.



Google, the brainchild of Larry Page and Sergey Brin while they were attending Stanford University, became a privately held company in 1998. In 2004, they had an IPO and raised \$1.6 sillion. Since then, Google has become the most used search engine in the world, and one of the most influential tech companies of our time.

Creation of the European single currency (the Euro) by the European Union.



DVR (TiVo) - Digital video recorders have changed the way that people view television, and have altered how advertising is created and consumed. The commercial is being slowly replaced by the product placement, and in general the DVR's ability to skip through commercials has caused the industry to look more towards embedding advertising in content. The first consumer level DVRs, ReplayTV and TiVo were released in 1999 at the Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas.

Mammal Cloning - The first animal to be cloned was a tadpole in 1952, but lan Wilmut was the first person to successfully clone a mammal — a sheep named Dolly — from somatic cells. Since then, similar processes have been used to clone dozens of other animals (including a horse). The process has also created an ethical debate that continues to this day.

Mother Theresa of Calcutta died a week later after Princess Diana, Sept 1997.

Comet Hale-Bopp was first spotted. It was considered to be the greatest comet in the 20th century. About 80% of Americans saw it without a telescope.

Stem Cell Research - Stem Cells have the unique ability to renew themselves and become a host of different cell types. In 1998, James Thomson and his team derived the first line of embryonic Stem Cells at the University of Wisconsin-Madison

Since then, research has been underway to find applications of Stem Cells in the treatment of diseases where healthy, unrepairable cells have been destroyed. Since Stem Cells can be harvested from human embryos, there is a strong debate over whether the technology is ethical.

After the "Bogoshi judgment" of the Appeal Court, the media is able to defend defamation cases without having to prove the information is true - only that there has been due care taken in gathering and publishing.

In February a "Record of Understanding" is agreed over a consultative process prior to any journalists being subpoenaed to testify in court. The Minister of Justice, the Minister of Safety and Security, the National Director of Public Prosecutions and Sanef are parties to the accord.

> The Human Genome Project was started in 1990 by James Watson of the National Institute of Health. iPod - While not the first MP3 player to be developed, it was the first to have massive public adoption. The Apple iPod, released in 2001, brought digital audio devices to the masses. Since then, it has become the most popular and most widely recognized audio device in the world.



Jimmy Wales - Based on pre-existing Wiki technology (and another encyclopedia project, Nupedia), Wikipedia was the first large-scale success of the Wiki. It is also one of the world's largest sources of information. Some controversy exists over the reliability of Wikipedia as a source of scholarly data, but it is still widely used as a reference.

1 June 2002, Hansie Cronje, South African cricketer dies.

> The Media Development and Diversity Agency is legislated into existence.



AbioCor the artificial heart, is the first fully implantable artificial heart. It was developed by Abiomed, a company based in Massachusetts. AbioCor runs on a rechargeable battery and has no tubes or wires exposed from the skin. It has a shelf life of about 18 months and was approved for use in 2006 by the FDA.

In May, Misa and UNESCO host the "Windhoek Declaration+10" conference which adopts the African Charter on Broadcasting calling for freedom of the airwaves and proper public service broadcasting.

Hurricane Katrina became the worst natural disaster in US history when it slammed into New Orleans on August 29, 2005.

SA Tsunami survivors back in Thailand

Categories

1. HARD NEWS

Journalism that is urgent, in the sense of being about a breaking story, typically written to tight deadlines and under pressure. The writing should be fresh, comprehensive, accurate and have high quality graphic description and pointed news salience.

2. ANALYSIS, COMMENTARY & ENTERPRISE NEWS

This category entails news articles that are the result of proactive reporter enterprise, as well as backgrounders that take a deeper look, sometimes opinionated, at a current news issue. This category is therefore distinct from breaking news, general feature articles and creative journalism. Characteristics such as perseverance, multi-sourcing and multi-perspectival views will be considered. Logical structure, depth of insight and quality of writing are also important.

3. FEATURE WRITING

Journalism that has entailed enterprise, investigation and persistence in gathering the information and which shows skill in telling the story. Feature writing may cover profiles, interviews, travel, trends etc. Quality of language, narrative skill, story structure and descriptive power of the features will also be considered in judging.

4. INVESTIGATIVE JOURNALISM

This is generally in-depth journalism resulting in scoops. Consideration will be given to research, perseverance, courage and innovation.

5. CREATIVE JOURNALISM

This journalism covers columns, creative writing and humorous pieces. Columns should be clear, engaging, persuasive - arguing a cogent case. Readability, interpretation and relevance to readers will be considered. Creative and humorous writing is entertaining without becoming pure fiction. Attention will be given to the use of language, wit and cross-cultural sensitivity.

6. FDITORIAL CARTOONS

These are assessed for graphic imagery, originality, cleverness and political or social punch. Simplicity, topicality and humour will be considered. Entrants should motivate why their work scores on these criteria, and a maximum of five entries may be submitted.

7. GRAPHIC JOURNALISM

Info-graphics and illustrations are eligible here. They should add value to a story, conveying meaning in a way that photos or text alone do not. Creativity and originality in concept, and the quality of execution will be considered. Clarity, vividness and communicative power are also factors. A maximum of five entries may be submitted.

8. POPULAR JOURNALISM

The winning story will be presented in a style that is simultaneously accessible, informative and entertaining, and its content will be about, and for, readers of tabloid journalism.

9. NEWS PHOTOGRAPHS

Published pictures of fast-breaking or spot-news comprise this category. Excellence in composition, lighting, action and other photographic qualities will be considered. The judges will assess both the original image and how it lent itself to being presented, and will therefore require a copy of both the original and the page on which it appeared.

10. FEATURE PHOTOGRAPHS

Published feature pictures that tell a story and which demonstrate reporting initiative are assessed under this category. Excellence in composition, lighting, action and other photographic qualities will be considered. The judges will assess both the original image and how it lent itself to being presented, and will therefore require a copy of both the original and the page on which it appeared.

11. SPORTS PHOTOGRAPHS

Published pictures taken at sports events constitute the distinctive subject matter here. The winning entries should show excellence in producing images that convey human drama and achievement, through techniques such as composition, the use of available lighting and the capturing of moments of action. The judges will assess both the original image and how it lent itself to being presented, and therefore require a copy of both the original and the page on which it appeared.

12. PRESENTATION - (Layout and design)

Content and headline treatment, the use of photographs and graphics and overall design will be assessed for clarity, readability and aesthetic attractiveness.

The treatment as a whole will be assessed as journalism.

13. SOUTH AFRICAN STORY OF THE YEAR

No entries are accepted for this category; instead the judges will select a winner from the range of entries in the other categories. This agenda-setting and original journalism contributes to society by giving new insight into the changing character of South Africa. Evidence of impact - such as changes and reforms resulting from the work - will be taken into account. The winning entry may be drawn from the winners of the other categories.

14. JOURNALISM TWENTY-TEN

This category marks the importance of the Soccer World Cup being staged in South Africa in 2010. The award is for a journalist who is able to "own" the story, through first-rate coverage of its many angles. Coverage may range from relevant matters around the games and players themselves, through to access issues, infrastructure and development, politics, environment, tourism, culture, sponsorship, money and intellectual property, amongst other aspects. A maximum of five articles may be submitted by any single entrant.

- The same work may be submitted for different categories, although separate copies of the work must then be included.
- A separate entry form must be submitted for each category entered.
- Any entry in any category will consist of not more than your top three (3) writing and/or graphical entries.
 However, entries into the investigative journalism categories must submit the full series of articles.
- Categories are open to individual, team or institutional entries.
- 7. Team entries will be limited to three individuals per entry.
- 8. A fee of R40 (VAT inclusive) per entry will be charged. Please pay / transfer the money into the NASA Account: Standard Bank Rosebank, Account number: 002026414; Branch Code: 004305. Please put as reference on the deposit slip: Mondi and your name. Cheques must be made payable to the Newspaper Association of SA (NASA). Payment or proof of payment must accompany the entry or it will not be accepted.
- It is imperative that your Editor or, in the case of freelancers, the Editor who has commissioned your services, signs and approves your entry, or your entry will not be accepted.
- 10. All entries should be mounted on minimum A3 or maximum A2 size, black or white cardboard. The mounting should be such that the board is suitable for display purposes. If the entry comprises more than one A3 page, the pages should be presented on different boards.
- 11. Each board should be clearly marked in the top right hand corner with the entrant's name, the page number (e.g. "pg 1 of 5") and the category name and number. It should be noted that individual stories will be seen as individual

- entries and should therefore be numbered as "Page 1 of 1".
- 12. Entry forms (originals or photocopies thereof), as well as letters of motivation for journalism entries, should be pasted flat on the reverse side of the first mounted page of the entry.
- Entry forms must be completed in full and signed by the person entering. If the form is not signed, your entry will be rejected.
- 14. Articles must be fully displayed and not in plastic sleeves, etc.
- The judges' decision is final and no correspondence will be entered into.
- 16. Entries become the property of the Newspaper Association and are not returnable. They may be utilised for display and publicity purposes for the awards, and deposited in a library archive.
- 17. The winning entries will be made available on the The Media website at www.themedia.co.za
- An electronic entry kit is available on the Mondi website at www.mondishanduka.co.za.

ADDITIONAL CRITERIA FOR ENTRIES INTO THE WRITING CATEGORIES:

- 1. Entries may be submitted in any official South African language.
- 2. It is recommended that when an entry is part of a wider series, a letter of motivation by the entrant, or any additional information, should be submitted. This is in cases where such documentation may give the judging panel more insight into the origination of the work. The motivation may address how the work was conceived, the time taken for its production, the obstacles faced and surmounted, and the impact that it had. Motivations should not be more than two A4 single-spaced typed pages. Letters of support from the Editor will be accepted as part of the motivation.
- Entries must include work as it appeared in final published form.

4. To accommodate newspapers which store their articles electronically, a hard copy of a print-out of the article or a photocopy of the original material will be accepted.

ADDITIONAL CRITERIA FOR PHOTOGRAPHIC ENTRANTS

- Entries must consist of work in final published form.
- Photographic entries must include a copy of BOTH the original image (in colour or black-and-white) and the published version. The copies of the original image should be between A5 and A4 in size.
- 3. There should be a maximum of 5 photographs.

Alan Kirkland Soga Achievement Award

The honour recognises a sustained and extraordinary contribution to newspaper journalism on the part of an individual. The winner will have demonstrated impeccable ethics and craft excellence. The results will have enriched South African public life. Where the person's accomplishment has been achieved in the face of obstacles, this will add to the nominee's ratings.

This award is named after the historical journalistic figure Alan Kirkland Soga. Born in the early 1860s, he served as editor of Izwi Labantu (Voice of the People) between 1898 – 1908. Soga also helped found the South African Native Press Association in 1902 – the first African news service in Africa. He also wrote a regular column in Umteteli wa Bantu in the early 1920s. Historian Les Switzer describes the man as "undoubtedly one of the leading intellectuals of his generation". Soga is remembered for the journalistic credo which he promoted: "Gainst the wrong that needs resistance; For the good that lacks assistance."

RULES

- 1. The individual's accomplishment should have been over a career of at least 20 years in journalism.
- 2. Judges are not eligible for nomination.
